Feed My Starving Children



Circleville First Church participated in packing manna packs for Feed My Starving Children. On October 12 a group travelled to Ohio State

University-Don Scott Field. At the first session, there were a total of 326 volunteers packing 393 boxes which will feed 232 children one meal a day for a year! The second session 365 boxes were packed (70,950 meals) which will feed 194 kids one meal a day for a year!

On October 18 a group journeyed to Jackson, Ohio and packed 29,160 meals to feed 79 kids for a year! On October 19, the first session 108 volunteers packed 144 boxes (31,104 meals). This will feed 85 kids for a year! The second session had 121 volunteers packing 138 boxes (29,808 meals), feeding 81 kids for a year! For this entire event, the group helped pack 540 boxes for 116,640 meals feeding 319 kids one meal a day for an entire year!!

Potato Sausage Kale Soup

In a Pam-sprayed big Dutch Oven pan, sauté one diced medium onion.

Sauté for just a few minutes.

Add ½ to 1 pound ground mild Italian sausage to the pot (you pick how much sausage you want in it)

Let simmer until no longer pink.

Add one 32 oz. carton of chicken stock.

Let come to a boil.

Add 4 Idaho potatoes, diced or cut with a mandolin.

Let boil until almost soft.

Add one bundle of washed and cut-up kale.

Let boil until soft and potatoes get done.

Add one small carton of cream.

Let heat through. Salt and pepper to your taste.

CFC...our brief history

In the winter of 1910-1911 (after the General Council meeting of 1910), Rev. O. L. Ferguson was contacted by Jake Chilcoat asking him to conduct a revival meeting in Circleville, Ohio. Rev. Ferguson agreed to come, not realizing that God had a plan for the denomination and the farming community of Circleville.

Why Circleville? This was a small farming town located right in the center of the state of Ohio with access to four state highways and between two larger communities. Twenty-five miles south of Columbus (present state capital) and twenty-two miles north of Chillicothe (first state capital). State Route 23 runs north and south (formerly North & South Court Streets), State Route 22 runs east and west (Lancaster Pike and Main Street), State Route 56 runs northwest and southeast (East and West Main Streets) and State Route 188 runs northeast to southwest (Northridge and North Court Street). All of these state highways meet in the center of downtown Circleville.

When Rev. Ferguson arrived in Circleville, they rented the second floor of the Circleville Oil Company building located on West Mound Street (just past the railroad tracks). God blessed the revival meetings over the next few months and the attendance grew. On February 21, 1911, a meeting was held at the home of John Arledge to organize the church. Rev. J.H. McKibben chaired the meeting and Rev. O.L. Ferguson was the secretary. Plans were made to raise money to purchase a lot and to build a church. A church board was also established at that meeting—James Baughman was elected first elder, F.M. Turner was second elder and David Ecord was third elder. Circleville First Church of Christ in Christian Union was officially established.

The building was completed some three to four months later, with a fair share of the work being performed by the ladies, who helped carry lumber and nail lathe on the building. The first service held in the church was a revival in December, 1911. Sixty more names were added to the membership that year.

For the first thirty-two years, O.L. Ferguson was the pastor 1911-1943
