What is Flag Day?

When the American Revolution broke out in 1775, the colonists weren't fighting united under a single flag. Instead, most regiments participating in the war for independence against the British fought under their own flags. In June of 1775, the Second Continental Congress met in Philadelphia to create the Continental

Army—a unified colonial fighting force—with the hopes of more organized battle against its colonial oppressors. This led to the creation of what was, essentially, the first "American" flag, the Continental Colors,

For some, this flag, which was comprised of 13 red and white alternating stripes and a Union Jack in the corner, was too similar to that of the British. George Washington soon realized that flying a flag that was even remotely close to the British flag was not a great confidence-builder for the revolutionary effort, so he turned his efforts towards creating a new symbol of freedom for the soon-to-be fledgling nation.



On June 14, 1777, the Second Continental Congress took a break from writing the Articles of Confederation and passed a resolution stating that "the flag of the United

States be 13 stripes, alternate red and white," and that "the union be 13 stars, white in a blue field, representing a new constellation."

Over 100 years later, in 1916, President Woodrow

Over 100 years later, in 1916, President Woodrow Wilson marked the anniversary of that decree by officially establishing June 14 as Flag Day.



War hero tells story



"I was involved in some but not all of these events, just where helicopters were involved."—Dan Mason

1965

April 22, 1965 First U.S. helicopter assault landing of Marines in Vietnam since Korea.

June 1, 1965 Marines laid down new air strip at Chu Lai. The first-time short air field for tactical support was used.

June 4, 1965 In the Da Nang area, five companies of Marines killed 79 Viet C ng in the heaviest action seen by Marines since landing in Vietnam in March.

June 7, 1965 There were more than 16,500 Marines in Vietnam.

July 1, 1965 Battalion Landing Team 317, special landing force went ashore at Qui Nhon. They were supported by helicopters from HMM-163 (my squadron). On this night, Viet Cong demolition squads walked down a road by the Da Nang Air Base, dropped a couple men off at each defending bunker on the south end of the field and blew them up using mortar fire. The rest of the enemy went down the rows of parked helicopters, opened he door to the compartment and threw bombs into the engines. They then headed off the base. Some were killed. The next day everyone below the rank of colonel was out filling up sand bags and building bunkers to re-enforce security of the air field.

1966

January 1, 1966 Marines in Vietnam numbered 38,500.

March 10, 1966 Marine helicopters evacuated special forces and ARVN (Army of the Republic of Vietnam) troops. Viet Cong encircled camp at A Shau.

March 30, **1966** U. S. Marines at Da Nang was surrounded by 2,000 taunting South Vietnamese.



March 31,1966 In six sweep and destroy missions around Chu Lai, Marines killed 1,382 Viet Cong.

April 1, 1966 After a little over a year in Vietnam, U.S. Marines received almost 5,000 Purple Hearts and Marine flyers and gunners had been awarded 10,000 air medals.

June 1966 1,233 Viet Cong were killed.

June 1966 An enemy force of more than 250 were driven back by 18 Marines in a six-hour battle when the Viet Cong attacked an outpost near Chu Lai. With most of the ammo gone, the Marines fought with bayonets, knives and rocks. This resulted in 5 Marines killed and 11 wounded while 40 enemy soldiers killed.

July 1966 4,600 more Marines landed.

November 14, 1966 Two Marine helicopters were shot down by Viet Cong snipers near Da Nang; 5 crewmen killed and 2 wounded.



1967

February 8-12, 1967 All offensive operations stopped during TET the Lunar New Year Holiday. Marines counted 141 enemy truce violations.

August 1, 1967 Marines in Vietnam totals 78,000.

August 28, 1967 Marble Mountain Air Facility (at Da Nang) was attacked. Three helicopters were destroyed and 20 damaged.

During this year 1967 There were continuous battles; Marines were killed and wounded.



1968—the saying was: "With a helicopter you were right in the enemy's face and had to know what to do like a street cop going into a bad neighborhood."

1968—81,249 Marines were in Vietnam.

January 16, 1968 26th Marines completed its move to Khe Sanh.

January 20, 1968 The second battle for Khe Sanh took place when Marines attacked a North Vietnamese Battalion, killing 100 of the enemy.

January 23, 1968 North Vietnamese soldiers moved closer to base perimeter at Khe Sanh; 61 Communists killed.

January 25, 1968 Enemy reinforcements began missing near Khe Sanh-reported concentration of 35,000 North Vietnamese to within 10-20 miles of Khe Sanh.

February 13, 1968 Marines killed 1,078 North Vietnamese and 52 Viet Cong in two weeks of fighting for the Imperial City of Hue. (continued on page 5)

February 23, 1968 Khe Sanh combat received more that 1,300 rounds of rocket artillery fire. During the month of February: 4,404 rounds of fire were fired at Khe Sanh.

February 24, 1968 Hue declared secure after a 25-day battle with 4.500 Communists killed.



March 8, 1968 Statistics show--the Marines bore the brunt of the heavy fighting in Vietnam. 80,000 Marines—during February, for every 5 soldiers killed, 3 of them were Marine soldiers. At Hue and Khe Sanh, there were 449 Marines killed and 4,000 wounded.

March 23, 1968 Khe Sanh received 625 rocket, mortar and artillery shots. Marine casualities were light.

March 30, 1968 From January 1, 1961 to date, Marine combat deaths were 6.893.

April 8, 1968 Seige of Khe Sanh ended.

July 5, 1968 Khe Sanh was dismantled, approximately 3,500 Marines moved out by truck after the last bunkers were destroyed.

July 28, 1968 Marines were ambushed by enemy force near Da Nang leaving 19 Marines killed and 32 wounded.

September 10, 1968 First unit of Marines left Vietnam—first unit to leave since build-up in 1965.

October 5, 1968 84,000 Marines in Vietnam; Marine causalities totaled more than 1,000.

February 8, 1969 Marines in Vietnam: 81,000.

June 8, 1969 Under President Nixon's plan, the redeployment of troops from Vietnam, 25,000 would be withdrawn by the end of August. This is Phase 1 which occurred on July 11.

August 14, 1969 76,000 Marines in Vietnam.

October 7, 1969 Last units from the initial group of 5,900 Marines left Vietnam.



October 16, 1969 67,000 Marines in Nam.

November 6, 1969 61,400 Marines in Vietnam.

December 25, 1969 Marines still in Vietnam totaled 55,300. submitted by **Dan Mason**
