

Comfy corner creations

Apple Cake

- 4 cups chopped apples,
- 2 cups sugar
- 2 eggs
- 1/2 cup vegetable oil
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 2 cups flour
- 2 teaspoons baking soda
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 teaspoons cinnamon
- 1 cup raisins and nuts



Combine apples and sugar. Mix flour, soda, cinnamon and salt. Beat eggs in bowl and add flour ingredients and vegetable oil alternatively. Add vanilla. Sir in apples, raisins and nuts. Place in 9x13 pan. Bake 350 for 1 hour. Happy Fall.

United States Marine Corps uniform

The Marine Corps has the best all-around uniform than any of the military services. The Dress Blue "A" prescribes several types of military uniform to distinguish its members from other armed services.



The dress uniforms of the USMC have been in service the longest and with the few changes have been worn in essentially its current form since the late 19th century.

September 5, 1776 the purchase of the Continental Marines Uniform regulations specifying green coats with white facings (lapels, cuff linings). They also had a higher leather collar to protect against cutlass slashes and to keep their head erect. That is when they got the nickname of Leathernecks and high collar on Marine Corps dress uniform.

In 1798, the Secretary of War authorized a blue uniform edged in red with sentiments for British Royal Marines.

In the expeditionary period post Civil War, the Marines wore khaki field uniforms. In the 1890's a campaign cover (also known as campaign hat) with a large Marine Corps emblem on the side and canvas leggings.

In 1912, the forest green uniform with a standing collar was adopted. The garrison cap, a broad-brimmed felt or straw hat, with a high crown, pinched symmetrically at the four corners, was introduced. The service uniform was designated for ceremonies, garrison and leave.

In 1926, a standing collar on the service uniform was changed to a rolled flat collar, a khaki version of the service uniform was adopted.

At the start of World War II, the Marine
Corps had four standard uniforms.
Dress Blues had a white canvas belt,
leather belt or a blue cloth belt for
officers. The green winter service
uniform with a coat and shell cordovan
garrison belt for enlisted men and adding a Sam Browne belt for
officers was worn as a field uniform.

The battle dress uniform became standard utilities in 1980's with woodland and 6 color desert patterns available.

Swagger sticks was fan informal accessory carried by officers in the late 19th century. In 1922, an entry in the uniform regulations

authorized enlisted Marines to carry them. In 1977, the commandant banned them from being carried while in uniform.

Types of Uniforms

The Marine Corps dress uniform is an elaborate uniform worn for formal or ceremonial occasions. The basic form of the blue jacket dates back to the 19th century. It is the only uniform that incorporates all three colors of the flag. There are three variations of the Dress uniform; Evening Dress, Blue Dress and Blue-White Dress; only officers and staff non-commissioned officers (SNCOs) are authorized to wear Evening Dress. The Blue Dress or Blues is the most recognizable uniform of the Marines. It is equivalent in formality and use to civilian black tie. There are four designations of the Blue Dress.

Blue Dress "A"

A midnight blue coat with standing collar. It has seven gilt buttons with red trim and a white web belt. While officers have a five-button coat that omits the red trim and black Sam Browne belt. All ranks wear a white peaked cap (also known as barracks cover), blue trousers, white gloves and black dress socks and shoes. Officers wear a plain, collarless, white button-up shirt with or without french cuffs. Full-size medals are worn on left chest with ribbon-only awards worn on the right—no marksmanship badges are worn.



Blue Dress "B"

Same as "A" but medals are replaced with corresponding ribbons on left chest and marksmanship badges may be worn.

Blue Dress "C"

Same as "B" but a khaki long-sleeved collared shirt and tie replaces the outer blue coat and white gloves Ribbons and badges are normally worn on the shirt.

Blue Dress "D"

Same as "C" but a short-sleeved khaki shirt and no tie.

Because the Blue Dress uniform is considered formal wear, Blue Dress "C" and "D" are rarely worn. Only "B", "C" and "D" dress blues are authorized for leave and liberty.



Officers and NCOs (Non-Commissioned Officers) wear a scarlet stripe (known as a blood stripe) down the outer seam of each leg of the trousers in honor of Marines that fell in Battle of Chapultepec in the Mexican War in 1847.

Evening Dress

Most formal and most elaborate of the Dress Uniform. Authorized for wear only by officers and SNCOs. It comes in three varieties.

The Marine Corps Dress Blue Uniform is said to be in nearly 241 years of tradition.

Service Uniform

Consists of green and khaki colors, adopted in 1943, which makes it the oldest service uniform still in use by the United States armed forces. It is equivalent to a business suit and is authorized for wear on leave or liberty. They are also designated as "A", "B" and "C". The "A" uniform is a green coat, trouser and khaki web belt, long-sleeved button-up khaki shirt, tie, tie clasp and black shoes.

Utility Uniform

Intended for wear in the field or for working parties. It is the



typical working uniform for all deployed and most garrison marines. There are two approved varieties of the uniform: woodland (green, brown and black) and desert (tan, brown and grey). In the summer months, the marines in garrison will roll the sleeves of the woodland blouse forming a neat cuff to present a crisper appearance.

Both officers and enlisted wear their rank insignia on each collar. Enlisted insignia is always black, while officers wear bright metal insignia.

Most badges and breast insignia can be worn on the utility uniform. The utilities are not permitted to be worn on leave or liberty except in a vehicle traveling from home and place of duty. The trouser legs are bloused (cuffs rolled inside and tightened over their boots with a spring or elastic ban known as boot band or blousing garter.
